WORSHIPPING WITH AWARENESS

"Do not neglect hospitality to strangers, for by this some have entertained angels without knowing it" (Hebrews 13:2) A worship service is not only an acknowledgement of God's reigning glorious presence, and a means of being drawn closer to his presence (James 4:8), but it is also the opportunity to be aware of those who are present with us, especially those who are our guests. In this, our church family has passed the test with flying colors; at least, according the test of an unnamed individual who created a scale by which he measured the churches he visited and how welcoming they were to him as a guest.

The account of the gentleman is that he visited 18 churches on successive Sunday's in a large metropolitan area. His stated purpose was to observe how he would be received by those within the congregation with whom he crossed paths. For objectivity sake, he followed the same protocol each Sunday. He would arrive early, mill around the foyer, enter the sanctuary, take a seat near the front, and prior to the service starting, return to the foyer area by another aisle before, once again, returning to his seat, where he remained until the end of the service.

The man said he dressed nicely, smiled at those with whom he made eye contact, asked individuals where he might find a restroom, others where he might find a cup of coffee, and people of various ages what program and bible study opportunities were available. Having developed a predetermined scale by which he would note the receptivity of each congregation, he then awarded points on the following basis:

10 Returned smile
10 Exchange of names
100 Conversation over coffee
200 Introduction to another worshipper
2000 Introduction to a pastor
3000 Invitation to lunch

On this scale, his data revealed that 11 out of the 18 churches earned fewer than 100 points. Five actually received less than 20. He correctly concluded: "The doctrine may be biblical, the sermon uplifting, but when a visitor finds no one cares whether they are there or not, they're not likely to return."

One of the prevailing comments I have heard over these many years is how warmly you greet and welcome those who are guests in our worship services. Out of curiosity, I took a letter written to me by a guest, where she went on effusively about the experience of her family upon their visit to First Baptist, and calculated that our church scored over 2,300 points, according to the scale above. What you do well, we must continue to do, especially in this age of fear and suspicion. The start of a new school year is just a few weeks away. For many, a new school year is not unlike the New Year of January 1-a time of resolutions and fresh starts. With that can come an influx of visitors, who will be our guests. When people care enough to visit, we must care enough to make them welcome. Our building can be daunting to the uninitiated. When you see an unfamiliar face, or bewildered look, in the parking lot, foyer, hallways, or sanctuary, smile, introduce yourself, and ask if you can help them find something.

According to the scale of the anonymous pollster, you have already won the "welcoming" contest. Win More!

One of the things that I've found interesting in working in College Ministry is that the school year doesn't start in August, it starts in May. As soon as the previous school year ends, our team begins planning for the upcoming year. It becomes not only a discipline of being prepared but also a time to celebrate in advance what God will be doing in our ministry over the next 12 months. We trust that God has empowered us to engage with college students in eternal matters. We trust that we have been given students to nurture, love, and push towards looking more and more like Jesus. None of this can be taken lightly. None of this is done haphazardly. Through prayer, strategizing, and brainstormina we spend the entire summer anticipating what God is going to do in our students.

This summer we engaged with over 250 incoming freshmen through Red Raider Orientation who expressed interest in our ministry and church. We also added to our Instagram following by a few dozen. This will allow us to engage with students who might not engage in any church ministry right away but desire the community that comes with that later in the semester.

This upcoming semester we plan to offer opportunities for people at all stages of faith. We will have large events aimed at outreach and engaging new students where the pressure is low, and the "fun" is high. We will have evangelistic opportunities for students to hear the gospel preached for the first time. We will have discipleship opportunities for those who know the Lord and desire to grow in a deeper relationship with Him. We trust that regardless of the outcomes, the Lord will be glorified through all this planning and preparation.

There is nothing more enjoyable for me than engaging face to face with students, but while we anxiously wait for the arrival of students on campus, we will continue to seek the face of Jesus in prayer and preparation. The rest is up to Him. If you want to engage with our college ministry, the best way to do that is to pray diligently for our staff, volunteer leadership, and our students. We know that God is doing something eternal in our ministry and we'd love to have you come alongside that as a prayer partner. If you are praying for our ministry, make sure to let one of us know, it is always such an encouragement to our team to know we aren't on this journey alone.


From these statements we derrived the Core Values that further define what drives the Worship and Arts Ministry at First Lubbock:







This summer, First Lubbock took forty-two youth and twenty-three adult leaders to Pueblo, CO for a week. It's called Mission 168 because there are 168 hours in a week. 168 hours for us to worship the Risen Savior. 168 hours to serve Him and love others. In 1 Timothy 4:12, Paul advises Timothy, "Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity." Our students did exactly that in Colorado.

We primarily worked with Scott Godinez to make improvements to the building that will soon become home to Lake Avenue Community Church. Scott is a former intern at First Lubbock, has served as a youth pastor at Cornerstone Church in Lone Tree, CO and at Belmar Church in Lakewood, CO, and is now the lead pastor of a church plant through North American Missions Board.

Throughout the week, our team painted rooms, ceilings, trim, doors,

handrails, and some incredible murals. We installed carpet in several rooms and vinyl flooring on the sanctuary stage, installed kitchen countertops, built fences, updated electrical work, and repaired drop ceilings. We also cleaned and organized, mowed the lawn, and trimmed trees. The building improvements will allow a new congregation to grow and serve the city of Pueblo, but it also gave us opportunities to share with individuals walking by the property who were interested in what we were doing and why.

Each day, groups also worked offsite at a variety of locations throughout Pueblo. We helped clean, organize, and stock a food pantry, entertain children with a giant slip 'n slide at a daycare, organize clothing and staples at a pregnancy center. Other groups cleaned facilities at a soccer complex, restocked the donations closets, cleaned floors, and painted a storage closet at the administration building for a domestic violence shelter. Everywhere we went, our students showed kindness and the love of Christ through their actions.

We also had fun together and built community within our youth group. Students played games and laughed while getting to know friends in other grade levels with whom they might not otherwise have much connection. Most importantly, we saw God move mightily! He used a group of kids to make a lasting impact in His Kingdom work in southern Colorado and set an example for us all in how to be the hands and feet of Jesus.

When Jesus arrived in the community of Sidon in Mark chapter 7, He met a deaf man with a speech impediment. The Greek word Mark used to describe this particular impairment was the word, "mogilalos," and it is only used once in the whole of the New Testament. In fact it only shows up once more in the Greek translation of the Old Testament, the Septuagint, this time selected by Isaiah. Well now, we can't pass up an opportunity to compare these two texts.

To describe the arrival of God's servant Isaiah says, "He will open the eyes of the blind and unplug the ears of the deaf. The lame will leap like a deer, and those who cannot speak (mogilalos) will sing for joy!" He goes on to list all of the restorative actions of the Lord, but I can't help but to stop and meditate on the gift of voice. Though sin once silenced the stammering lips of Adam's desperate sons, now hope breathes air through the woodwinds, peace fills the bellows of the brass, and faith is the bow on the strings, each in perfect harmony for joy's orchestra to burst out the mouth of those given new life by King Jesus.

The deaf and mute man in Mark 7

was healed by Jesus, and he couldn't hold back from declaring the glory of his Lord. Even those in the community around this healed man said of Jesus, "Everything He does is wonderful!" A centuries old Prophecy was fulfilled before their eyes and in their very own mouths as God's Servant was establishing The Kingdom.

Inspired by this story of God's Kingdom breaking into earth, I wrote a song for our church to sing. You can check out the lyrics on the next page as we join with the choir of our faith ancestors: Jesus, everything You do is wonderful!



I have the opportunity and privilege to witness generosity from our church members on a weekly, sometimes daily, basis. Many of our church members give to the storehouse tithe weekly, monthly, and yearly. Their generosity shows itself when someone goes above and beyond the expectation of the tithe with gifts of kindness, service, giving extra dollars or time.

Last month I was privileged to travel

to Perryton, Texas with a team from First Lubbock to assist in relief after the devastating tornado that set down in their town ten days earlier. When we arrived, we saw not only the destruction that nature had released on that community but hundreds of people being generous with whatever gifts God had given them.

We set up at First Baptist Church Perryton where their members had already staged a base where people could be fed, receive water and supplies, and get directions to help with the many tasks that still needed to be completed. They were organized, well supplied, and ready and willing to face whatever opportunity was ahead of them. We often hear about people rising the occasion after a disaster. This site was no different. Texas Baptist Men had also set up at the church and were doing a great work with the second team on site and preparing for a third. Samaritan's Purse and a couple of other groups designed to assist in times of trouble were also there. What caught my eye was the "out of the box" generosity.

Jerry and Ryan had gone to Perryton to assess the needs and make a plan for our team. They received a list of needs that included everything from socks and duct tape to animal food and diapers. First Lubbock responded quickly and supplied large amounts of everything on the list.

The church had set up tables in their utility barn, where we were also fed, that had pretty much everything you might need as you worked on a given task. Everything on the tables had been donated. There were over-the-counter medical and first aid supplies, cases and cases of water, electrolyte powders to add to your water, sunscreen, hand sanitizer, and even Rolaids. There were energy bars, snacks, candy bars, and gum. Pretty general stuff, right? But someone even donated three Stihl chainsaws. There were also battery chargers for phones and any size battery you might need. We also saw cooling neck wraps, Igloo coolers, and air mattresses. There were brooms, shovels, and other landscaping tools, all donated, all very much needed.

Another ministry there was called Mercy Chefs. They respond to disasters all over the world to feed people. They had set up in a different church parking lot and would cook meals, good meals, for anyone and everyone involved in the disaster. While we were there, they cooked around 400 meals at lunch and dinner every day. Local groups would then pick up the meals and distribute them to the people in need and to volunteers.

There was a man from Clovis, NM that showed up the day after the tornado touched down. He brought a brand-new track skid steer on a trailer and proceeded to do whatever anyone needed, moving rubble, or tearing down structures that had been damaged. After working a couple of days, he needed to return to Clovis and get back to his job, but he left his skid steer and trailer there for anyone to use as long as they needed it. He said to give him a call when they were done, and he would come and pick it up.

Countless community members took off work or put their businesses on hold to organize relief, operate machinery, clear rubble, and minister to those in need. Other groups, like ours, showed up from nearby towns and faraway cities to help in any way they could.

We talk about being on mission where our feet are, and we saw many people doing just that. They also had their heads on swivels to see what might be needed before it was needed. We also saw people reaching deep into their pockets above and beyond what they might do on any given Sunday to meet the needs of the victims as well as the volunteers. They also gave of their time and talents. Disaster relief doesn't keep an eight-to-five schedule. They worked, and when they were tired, they worked some more.

At First Lubbock, we respond well to the needs of others when disaster strikes or when the needs of individuals are made known to us. Thank you for that. Thank you for giving to the storehouse tithe and for going the extra step and being generous. I love my church.

My challenge coming away from that opportunity is to continue to be on mission where my feet are and to keep my head on a swivel. I need to look outside the box and meet the needs of those around me, being creative and inventive in the multitude of ways I can serve those around me. What is your challenge?
