



PROVING OUT THE RESURRECTION

Thomas Jefferson had a distinctive understanding of the Christian faith; a “spin” so unique, he decided to write his own bible. Lacking word processor software, Jefferson, nonetheless, achieved his task by, literally, cutting and pasting. Using a razor, he cut out the parts of scripture with which he did not agree, and pasted together the remaining portions. A fully printed edition of the Jefferson Bible was completed in 1819.

In 1904, the United States Congress published a special reproduction of the Jefferson Bible. That same year every new member of Congress received a Jefferson Bible; a practice that continued into the 1950’s.

Jefferson excluded from his bible all miracles, most allusions to anything supernatural, and the resurrection. As a result, all that remained in the text were the moral teachings of Jesus. The closing words of his gospel accounts, read:

“There laid they Jesus and rolled a great stone at the mouth of the sepulcher and departed.”

Instead of a risen Savior, the Jefferson Bible offers you a dead philosopher. Remove the resurrection and you have no Gospel. Leave Jesus lying in a tomb and there is no Good News. If Jesus is still lying in a tomb, then all who have ever professed faith in Christ are dead in their trespasses and sin. If there is no resurrection, then there is no hope beyond this life. If there is no resurrection, then our faith is in vain.

Easter Sunday is but a seasonal reminder of what should be passionately and intentionally celebrated every Sunday; that we serve a resurrected Savior. The first disciples did not believe in the resurrection because they could not find his dead body; they believed because they found a living Christ. The gospel does not explain the resurrection; the resurrection explains the Gospel.

I pray that Easter might be a time of renewal for many; a fresh start for the church of the Lord Jesus Christ to prove out the resurrection.

As appalled as some might be by the actions of Jefferson, in writing a bible of his own liking, it is no less done by countless numbers of professing believers, who have eliminated the resurrection life from their daily existence. It’s by our presence with the saints, our perseverance in the trials of life, and our practice of the Lordship of Christ in every facet of life that the resurrection is proved out to a watching and wondering world.

AN EASY JUMP

Genesis 2:15 has some interesting grammatical implications. It reads, “The Lord God took the man (Adam) and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it.”

The Hebrew word for “work” is “*abad*” and it is often translated as “service.” Therefore, John Mark Comer argues that it’s easy to jump to the conclusion that work is an act of service, and this service is made unto God and everyone made in His image.¹

BUT, “*abad*” is also the exact same word used throughout the Old Testament for “worship.” Therefore, Comer continues that it’s an even easier jump to say that “work and worship are NOT two separate ideas, rather, they are two translations of the same word, which makes them interconnected.”

Sadly, far too often, we think of worship as a few songs sung with our church family on a Sunday morning. While that act is most certainly worship, it is NOT all there is, it is not the full spectrum of worship. You see, in a Genesis-shaped worldview all of life is worship. So, what does “all of life is worship” include? Here’s an alphabetized list:

- Giving **A**dvice
- B**aking
- C**alibrating your digital scale (because it always seems to show things as heavier than they really are)
- D**rinking water (instead of stuff that’s not good for you)
- E**levating others over yourself
- F**orgiving others who have wronged you
- G**iving your time, talent and treasures in and through your local church
- Play **H**ide and seek
- I**mparting godly wisdom
- Repairing floor **J**oists
- Cooking **K**abobs
- Drinking **L**oose-leaf tea (because we certainly don’t want tight-leaf tea)
- M**editating on scripture
- Calling someone by their **N**ame
- Turning **O**ff the tv to spend time with your loved ones (unless there’s a ballgame on)
- P**raying to God, moment by moment, about everything
- Asking really good **Q**uestions (because the idea that there are no bad questions is preposterous)
- R**aking the leaves (NOT raking someone over the coals)
- S**earching for ways to shower others with kindness and encouragement
- T**aking out the trash
- U**nbaring an “entrance” that would hinder ANYONE from coming to Christ
- Taking a **V**acation (without putting amazing pictures on Facebook of all your incredible fun because that would cause others to “stumble”)
- W**ading in a river or stream (this is an act that is very difficult to do near Lubbock...I strongly advise that if you plan to do this that you go on a pilgrimage, either north and west, or south and east, unless, of course, if it rains—you can just go out in the street)
- X**eriscaping
- Y**odeling
- Using **Z**ipties to clean up messy cords behind your A/V system at home (for cleanliness is next to godliness).

Tim Keller says that “work is rearranging the raw material of God’s creation in such a way that it helps the world in general, and people in particular, thrive and flourish.”² And, given that work and worship are so closely connected (from the same Hebrew word), again I say, work can (and should) be a form of worship. As the Apostle Paul said, “Whatever you do, give it your very best, as if you were working for the Master and not for human beings” (Colossians 3.23). It’s an easy jump, then, to conclude whatever we choose to do as a vocation, or as needed/necessary chores for ourselves, and anything and everything out love and concern for others. As Peterson describes it in *The Message*: “God helping you: Take your everyday, ordinary life—your sleeping, eating, going-to-work, and walking-around life—and place it before God as an offering” (Romans 12.1-2).

It’s not a big jump, it’s an easy jump actually, to see all of our lives, everything we do, think and say, as worship to Almighty God. The difficult part is actually making all that worship something we are proud of Him receiving as our worship—to Him, for what He’s done, for what He’s doing, and for what He will do—in us and through us, for the rest of eternity! THAT’s a big (but gloriously adventurous jump)! Let’s jump together...every day, all day!

GRATITUDE

Last week we took a group of college students to New Orleans, Louisiana to assist a church there. Last October they were hit with a hurricane and a tornado leaving parts of their building unusable. We helped them get to a place where they can begin to use those buildings again, but more importantly, we were able to model a cooperation within the Body of Christ where one local body helps another. As I reflected on this truth, I was filled with one emotion, gratitude.

Each night we would gather in a small room above the gym. No fancy lights. No sound system. Acoustically, the room was objectively poor. And yet, we had some of the most powerful worship moments I've ever experienced. One song in particular was sung more than the others and its truth is significant. "Gratitude" is a new song by Brandon Lake. In the song, the writer laments that his praise and adoration is unworthy of the God who receives it, yet knowing it's the only thing available to him, he continues to worship.

*So I throw up my hands
And praise You again and again
'Cause all that I have is a hallelujah
Hallelujah
And I know it's not much
But I've nothing else fit for a King
Except for a heart singing hallelujah*

This sentiment seems an easy one for us to appreciate. Knowing our praises fall short of the God we serve while believing God has called us to continue offering them is a sweet dichotomy. What really blows me away is that God not only accepts our praise but Scripture tells us that he even inhabits our praise.

Sometimes gratitude may be easier to embody. Last week it was easy for me. Raw worship, service benefiting others, watching the Church cooperate well together all contribute to a real sense of thankfulness. But next week it may not be so easy. It may be harder if you find yourself in financial distress to tell God how grateful you are. It may be difficult when dealing with familial crises to thank God for his goodness. But it would benefit us all if we could embrace an attitude of gratitude in whatever circumstances. After all, we are expressing gratitude for the character of God, not our situation in life—and that will never change.

Lately, I feel like all I hear through advertisements is where to invest:

“Be sure to contribute to an IRA.”

“Diversify your portfolio with precious metals!”

“BUY CRYPTO!!”

Now it could be that I’m hearing more of these ads as a result of targeted advertising based on my demographics, but it may also be the case that I am listening more carefully as I have become more serious about investing. Just as I have become more conscious about investing in a fiscal sense I have also been reviewing the ventures in my life. What is truly worth the buy-in of my God-given resources? Which thing offers the greatest dividends? And the greatest question: how do I spend my most precious asset, time?

One truth I’ve kept coming back to through all of this is the critical nature of time spent in relationships. A relationship without a regular contribution of time simply will not grow. I believe one of Zig Ziglar’s most popular quotes captures this concept well: “love is spelled T-I-M-E.” On numerous occasions scripture gives examples of the correlation between time spent and the depth of a relationship. The Gospels recount Jesus’ desire for time with his disciples, the importance he placed on meals with people in their homes, and his willingness to spend time with outcasts. Another good example of time and relationship is told by the Apostle Paul himself writing to the Christ-followers in Thessalonica. In his heartfelt

letters, Paul expresses numerous times his love and desire to be with these brothers and sisters in faith. He recalls his time spent with them in this way: “...We loved you so much, we were delighted to share with you not only the gospel of God but our lives as well” (1 Thess. 2:8). Notice his joy is found in both sharing the gospel, but also his very life. In other words, he found exceeding joy in spending time with these people! His investment of time spent in relationship with them really paid out!

Investing, simply by definition, is costly though. It can be hard to make a change in a budget, to cut spending in other areas, and to even identify the need to invest at all! We as a church acknowledge the challenge and aim to help you in this. We have offered a unique way for spouses to stay connected through consistent and intentional time together in our Date Challenge. We’ve had over 60 couples accept this challenge and I believe have seen benefits in their marriages. I encourage the men of our church to consider two other great upcoming events: our second annual Cornhole Tournament and our Dad-Kid Campout. Every story about Jesus in the Gospels is stirring. My heart is captured every time I read about the way He loved and cared for people.



HARD TIMES

I recently came across an old 1975 movie called *Hard Times* that stars Charles Bronson & James Colburn. It's about an aging drifter moving around the country during the great depression looking for bare knuckle fights to make ends meet. This is one of my favorite Bronson movies and I have seen it dozens of times. Even though this movie has been around for nearly 50 years, I still must give you a spoiler alert.

Hard Times begins with Bronson coming to town looking to make \$5,000. In order to do this he teams up with James Colburn, and they make a deal to set up fights and split the winnings between themselves. Along the way, Colburn and Bronson meet a colorful cast of characters that includes Jill Ireland, Strother Martin, and an endearing stray cat. Eventually Bronson makes his \$5,000, but all of that is threatened when Colburn gets involved with the wrong crowd, gambles his winnings away, and is unable to repay his debts to a gang of local mobsters.

In the end, the mobsters capture Colburn and threaten to kill him if Bronson doesn't have one more fight, this time against a professional prize fighter they have brought in from Chicago. Bronson could have easily walked away from this challenge. After all, he already made the money he set out to make. But, you guessed it, he does the right thing, shows up for the fight, risks all his winnings for his partner, and most importantly, he wins! With the win, not only does Bronson double his prize money, but he also fully pays off Colburn's debts.

As Bronson prepares to set off on his own, he hands Strother Martin and Colburn a handsome portion of his winnings. To Strother he says, "You take care of the cat."

And to Colburn he says, "You take care of him." And he rides off into the sunset with \$5,000.

Something stood out to me as I watched this movie that I have never picked up on before. Bronson had a plan, he was focused on that plan and pursued it with everything he had. After accomplishing his goal, he risked it all to help out a fellow human being. Not a friend, not a family member, but an associate who needed help.

Some of us may be in somewhat difficult times, but I believe we all have a plan. And sometimes when the plan is interrupted we have the opportunity to step up and help those around us. I have the privilege of seeing this played out on a regular basis in our church. Our members know what they need to survive and are working hard toward that goal. and my thoughts than your thoughts."***



THE RACE IS ON


